## ASOP Fracture Casting Training for Medical Assistants

### Executive Summary

The included membership, textbooks and study materials, casting videos, live Zoom casting sessions, Fracture Forum Newsletter 2x weekly education, and broader online learning opportunities allow the medical assistant to review techniques, reinforce safety principles, prepare for the ROT examination, and continue professional development throughout the following year.

- **Substantial personal practice:** ASOP reports that each student applies 10 or more casts during the two-day workshop.
- **Continuing education included in tuition:** ASOP public materials list up to 14 CE hours for a broad clinical audience. Each attendee should verify acceptance with the relevant licensing or certification body.
- **One-year learning relationship:** every workshop student receives a one-year ASOP membership and access to member education and professional-development opportunities.
- **Experience and scale:** ASOP administration reports more than 17,000 attendees trained since 2001 and more than 600 private workshops in military, hospital, academic, private-practice, and international settings.

*This continuing structure is especially important for medical assistants, who need repeated review and supervised application to turn workshop learning into reliable workplace competency.*

## Scope of Practice and ROT Qualification

**Medical assistants may be limited by state law or employer policy from applying casts or splints solely under the MA role.** After substantive cast-application training, documented supervised competency, completion of ASOP's current experience requirement, and passage of the Registered Orthopedic Technologist (ROT) examination, the individual has met ASOP's requirements for the ROT credential. In a state and practice where casting and splinting may be delegated, ROT can satisfy the additional orthopedic qualification required by the employer. ROT does not independently override a state prohibition or facility restriction.

**ROT establishes an orthopedic credential and documented qualification procedure-specific competency validation.**

## Recommended Training and Credential Sequence

- **1. Complete ASOP hands-on training.** Use the two-day workshop to build foundational application, molding, safety, removal, and patient-care skills through repeated personal practice.
- **2. Continue learning online.** Use the included textbooks, casting videos, study resources, member Zooms, Fracture Forum education, and other ASOP online opportunities throughout the one-year membership.
- **3. Validate workplace competency.** Use a qualified preceptor, written procedure checklists, supervised applications, complication-response training, and separate sign-offs for each authorized procedure.
- **4. Document experience and earn ROT.** Maintain an auditable procedure log, satisfy the current experience requirement, prepare with the included resources, and pass the ROT examination.
- **5. Obtain written role authorization.** After credentialing, the practice should specify the procedures the employee may perform, the required supervision, and the situations that require escalation or a different clinician.

## Employer Responsibilities

- **Pay tuition and reasonable travel,** or host an on-site workshop when several employees need training.
- **Protect time for both the workshop and the continuing online education** included with membership.
- **Assign qualified primary and backup preceptors** who are permitted to teach and supervise the approved procedures. ASOP has an "Approved ASOP Instructor" program for practices.
- **Provide supplies, simulation time,** and the same casting equipment used in the practice.
- **Use written checklists and procedure logs** with separate competency sign-offs for every cast, splint, and removal skill. ASOP has available skill sheets for casting and splinting.
- **Define restricted procedures** and schedule continuing reassessment after initial qualification.

## Final Recommendation

**Select ASOP as the primary fracture-casting training pathway for medical assistants working in orthopedic practices.** The value of the program is not confined to the two-day workshop. It combines substantial reported hands-on repetitions with a full year of continued education and member support, including four major textbooks/manuals, casting videos, online study resources, free live casting Zooms, twice-weekly Fracture Forum education, continuing-education opportunities, and preparation for the ROT pathway. The practice should pair these resources with supervised competency validation, written procedure authorization, and compliance with state delegation and supervision requirements.
